



HTML – Trying it Out

Exercise #6

This exercise will give you an opportunity to try out some of the basic tags covered in the class lessons so far.

1. Open the template.htm document and save it as **exercise6.htm** and set the title tag to:
HTML – Trying It Out
2. Copy and paste the text provided below between the <body> ... </body> tags of the page you saved in Step 1. Once you've done that, make the word or line appear as it states.
